Part I, A.M. Session (0800-1200)**

Selection, Engagement and Seduction of Children and Adults by Child Molesters

DESCRIPTION: Participants will examine (via video taped interviews with various types of sex offenders) some of the strategies used by offenders to target, seduce, and exploit children and adults. Information was collected from approximately 1,400 sex offenders who were involved in long term, court mandated sex offender treatment. Topics include offender descriptions of "grooming" tactics, i.e., how and why they target certain children, families, and youth serving agencies, how they seduce child victims and adult caretakers and, how they inhibit disclosure, detection and reporting. The speaker will also address the possible number of undetected offenders and sexual crimes occurring in our communities, "cross over" sexual crimes, recidivism/re-offense rates, treatment outcomes, and the increasing trend in sexually deviant behavior associated with the Internet.

Part II, P.M. Session (1300-1700)

What Sex Offenders Can Teach Us About Interviewing

DESCRIPTION: This presentation will review several studies that examined sex offender characteristics and the effectiveness of various interview styles on confession rates. Studies examined the impact of offender age, personality, offense history, and experience with the criminal justice system as they relate to admissions. Studies have also examined the impact of victim attributes, relationship between the victim and offender, specific sex acts performed, and the impact of investigator demeanor and interview style on confessions. Studies appear to confirm previously suspected notions about the thoughts and concerns offenders have during police interviews, and the reasons offenders decline to be interviewed, confess, or lie. Offender quotes and video clips will be used to illustrate the various findings. The presentation will also include anecdotal comments from 121 adult male sex offenders and 26 veteran child abuse/sex crime detectives from 10 law enforcement agencies in Oregon.

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“Protecting our Children: Advice From Child Molesters” Oregon’s Innovative Approach to Child Safety, Crime Prevention, and Community Policing.

DESCRIPTION: Participants will have an opportunity to review and consider the benefits of implementing Oregon’s grassroots prevention project, “Protecting our Children: Advice From Child Molesters.” Initially developed by two sex offender treatment providers, “PYC” has grown into a multi-county, multi-disciplinary child abuse prevention campaign. The project was designed to educate parents, youth service staff, educators, community volunteers, and the faith community about child sexual abuse, sex offender behavior, risk management, and prevention strategies. Workshops focus on offender behavior, challenge public misperceptions about the ability of children to protect themselves, and promote the idea that **all** adults must be informed, **and** take an active role in promoting child safety.

Information about offender grooming behavior, Internet crimes, victim advocacy, reporting, sexual behavior between children, and talking to children about child sexual abuse are covered. Potential project benefits such as jury education and early intervention with potential offenders have also been found. Classes are taught by child abuse detectives, child/victim advocates, prosecutors, probation/parole officers, and sex offender treatment providers.

Bio: Cory Jewell Jensen, M.S. is the Co-Director of the Center for Behavioral Intervention in Beaverton, Oregon. Jensen has worked with adult sex offenders for 28 years, and provided training and/or consultation to The National Center for the Prosecution of Child Abuse, The United States Navy, The Mark McGwire Foundation for Children, and a number of local and national law enforcement and child advocacy organizations. She has provided workshops at the Dallas Crimes Against Children, The National Symposium on Child Abuse, the U.S. Marshall's Sex Offender Watch Conference, the Children's Justice Conference, the National Child Advocacy Conference, the Office of Investigation and Training Conference, and the National Sexual Assault Response Team Conference. She served as the Executive Director for the Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abusers, is a Past-President of the Oregon Chapter of ATSA, chaired the Offender Management Committee attached to the Oregon Attorney General's Sexual Assault Task Force, and was also on the Legislative and Policy Board of the Oregon SAFT. She received Oregon's "Commercial Crime Prevention Award," the "Champions for Children Award," the OATSA "Significant Achievement Award," the Nunnenkamp "Award of Excellence," and the Jan Hindman Memorial Award. Jensen has also published a number of articles on the evaluation and treatment of sex offenders, testified as an expert witness in local and federal courts, and been a featured guest on radio talk shows and the Oprah Winfrey Show.
