# Campus Crime Prevention Training Coming To The University of Washington

The Campus Crime Prevention curriculum was designed by the National Crime Prevention Council and college crime prevention practitioners to provide participants with the knowledge, skills, and resources to lead crime prevention services for their university and campus and to foster relationships with partners and necessary personnel to enable their crime prevention plan to be successful. It will provide the latest information, tools, and resources in the area of campus crime prevention including best practices in college crime prevention, Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) strategies; security surveys; campus crime prevention programs such as assaults and violence, drugs and alcohol, and sexual crimes; community policing strategies; resident hall and student housing security; and available crime prevention resources.

- Identify at least two tested prevention-focused program strategies to address a crime- or security-related issues on campus
- Describe the role of partnerships among law enforcement/security, students, administrators, and staff in creating a safer, more secure campus
- Name a safety or security feature of an on campus facility and how it could be enhanced using prevention-focused strategies or tools
- Use an audit tool to assess specific facilities or locations on campus for vulnerability to crime and security problems
- Develop a plan for informing students, faculty, and staff about their role(s) in creating a safer, more secure campus community
- Incorporate crime prevention and security awareness into orientation for new students and staff
