
### **Kaelin Glazier Missing Person & Homicide Investigation**

Kaelin Glazier age 15, disappeared on a moonless night on Nov. 6, 1996. Her body was not found until April 2008, when a neighbor was mowing a field and found a skull and one tennis shoe sticking out of the ground. Dental records and a ring identified the remains as Glazier. Her head was wrapped in duct tape and a cut on a rib indicated she may have been stabbed. William Frank Simmons was arrested two years later. In February 2012, following a lengthy circumstantial evidence trial, Simmons was found guilty of First Degree Manslaughter and sentenced to prison for more than 7 years. This presentation will detail the complex long term missing person investigation, including the crime scene following the discovery of the remains 12 years later, as well as the use of forensic anthropologists, advanced searching strategies, interviewing strategies and the successful prosecution of a circumstantial case. The presentation will also discuss the importance of effectively managing missing persons and “runaways.”

### **Juggalo Street Gang Murder Investigation**

On the morning of April 14, 2008, construction workers found a man's dead battered, body at a job site in downtown Seattle, just a few blocks from Freeway Park. Pools of blood were everywhere. Close by were the instruments that had been used to break his bones from head to toe and cause a hemorrhage in his brain: two-by-fours, an iron crowbar, and other heavy construction tools. The victim was later identified as 25 year-old Noel Lopez. Noel Lopez wasn't a typical of the street kid and he wasn't a runaway or a throwaway. He had a caring family who were eager to help him. He wasn't an aimless high-school dropout with few options. Faced with a challenging scene and no leads, investigators eventually identified and arrested the suspects – Steven Bauder and Marcus Dennis, members of downtown Seattle's subculture of Juggalos – a violent street gang. Bauder was reportedly called up from Oregon to Seattle to deal with Lopez. This presentation will outline the challenges of the investigation and provide investigators with some insight into this violent street gang.



### **Torture and Murder of Jeanette Maples**

In December 2009, medics responded to a 911 call at Jeanette Marple's north Eugene home and discovered the teen injured and unconscious in a bathtub. She died later that night at a local hospital. Her mother, Angela Darlene McAnulty, 41, and step-father, Richard Anthony McAnulty, 40, subsequently were arrested and charged with aggravated murder. The estate of Jeanette Marples later filed a lawsuit against the State of Oregon seeking \$1.5 million for not preventing the torture and murder of the 15 year-old girl at the hands of her mother.

The case study will examine the tragic death of 15-year-old Jeanette Maples who was tortured, starved and beaten to death by her mother and stepfather. The presenters will discuss the system's failure to save Jeanette. Angela McAnulty is currently the only woman on Oregon's Death Row. This presentation will detail the complex investigation, including the crime scene, the child's injuries, the interviewing techniques used, and the successful prosecution of both offenders.

**Womack Serial Murder Investigation - Portland Police Bureau—Homicide Detail**

In May 2006, Shawn Womack planned to stage robberies with a handgun purchased by his girlfriend, Jasmine Lesniak, because they needed money while they were students at Linn-Benton Community College in Albany. Ultimately Womack killed two men in separate carjackings and then killed Marissa Manwarren, the 17-year-old girlfriend of an accomplice after she had learned about the murders. Womack stole the cars of the two victims with his accomplice, Covelino Capuia, who was later arrested on an unrelated robbery charge. After Capuia was arrested, Womack and Lesniak picked up Manwarren, apparently to give her a ride, but Womack instead drove to a rural area of Benton County, forced the teen out of the car and shot her execution-style. He then put her body in the trunk of the car, and drove to the Oregon coast near Newport to dump the body.


**Unsolved Murder Investigation - Douglas County Sheriff's Office**

On October 1, 2009 at about 1810 hours, an unknown male entered a residence in Glendale, Oregon and shot two women; 59 year-old Barbara Tooley died at the scene and 88 year-old Helen Long survived her gunshot wounds. The male suspect was observed in the neighborhood and a possible related vehicle in the area. There were no signs of a burglary and has the appearance of a possible thrill kill type scenario. This case remains unsolved.



**Len Bias Prosecutions - Clackamas County DA's Office & Oregon US Attorney's Office**

The Len Bias Law, named after a University of Maryland basketball player who died of a cocaine overdose in 1986, enables prosecutors to seek stiffer penalties against people involved in the distribution of a drug that leads to a fatal overdose. Since 2004, 34 people in Oregon have faced prosecution under the Len Bias Law and 27 were convicted.



**Dani Countyman Murder Investigation "Lessons Learned" - Clackamas County Sheriff's Office**

Dani Countryman died from strangulation in July of 2007 while partying at an apartment complex in Milwaukie. Alejandro Rivera-Gamboa admitted he killed 15 year-old Dani Countryman, saying he stepped on her throat while his cousin tried to rape her. He was sentenced to life in prison. His cousin, Gilberto Arellano-Gamboa, will serve nearly six years for attempted sexual abuse. The family filed a civil suit against Clackamas County seeking \$3.5 million alleging authorities knew Countryman's killer was in the country illegally. This case prompted Clackamas County to define its policy on the handling of immigrant criminal cases. Two months after Countryman's death, Clackamas County authorities clarified county law giving police and prosecutors the ability to report non-documented individuals to immigration officials after they have been arrested on other charges. The investigators will present "lessons learned" in an effort to assist other investigators faced with similar situations.

**Oregon Missing Persons - Lane County Sheriff's Office**

With currently over 1,000 missing persons cases in Oregon, shrinking budgets in law enforcement, and an increased work demand per our ORS in these cases, what are some ways to more efficiently and effectively manage your case loads? This presentation will discuss strategies and resources for acquiring, networking, and maintaining records in long term missing persons cases. The presentation will include case examples that highlight both successes and failures in missing persons cases. Checklists and resource lists will be available to attendees following the presentation.
