Ongoing research is dedicated to our nation's law enforcement professionals who continue to make many sacrifices in serving and protecting society. The **FBI-LEOKA Officer Safety & Survival Program** is designed to assist law enforcement managers, trainers, and personnel in the identification of training issues for the purpose of preventing the deaths and/or serious injuries of law enforcement personnel. This program is based on more than twenty-years of research by the FBI in collaboration with local state, and federal law enforcement agencies throughout the United States.

This presentation includes review of case studies with video interviews of officers and offenders involved in violent encounter situations.

Federal Bureau of Investigation Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted Program Officer Safety Awareness Training Instructor

Philip Wright, an 18 year veteran of law enforcement, started his career in 1994 as a patrol officer with the Clarksburg Police Department, Clarksburg, West Virginia. Philip completed fifteen (15) weeks of basic training at the West Virginia State Police Academy before starting his career at Clarksburg P. D. He also worked undercover in a sting operation involving a large gambling ring as well as working with the multijurisdictional Drug Task Force. He was also selected to be a member of the Special Response Team (SRT). Philip completed the specialized training at the Fort McClellan Army Military Base located in Fort McClellan, Alabama. The training included entry tactics, "flash bang" deployment, building/room searches, take down tactics, handcuffing techniques, and officer down recovery tactics.

After five years with the Clarksburg Police Department, Philip joined the ranks of the West Virginia State Police as a trooper. Philip completed 26 weeks of state police cadet training at the West Virginia State Police Academy. Philip was assigned to the Bridgeport Detachment where he specialized in Criminal Investigations. Philip specialized in Interview and Interrogation techniques, crimes against children, sexual assault investigations, and was a member of specialized unit involving child abuse / sexual assaults against children. Philip was a certified Forensic Interviewer of children who were suspected victims of sexual assault / child abuse. His everyday responsibilities included emergency service calls, road law enforcement, traffic crash / fatality investigations, warrant service, search warrants, and criminal investigations (Homicide / sexual assault).

Of significance to the LEOKA Program, Philip assisted in the Officer Survivability Training (OST) at the West Virginia State Police Academy. The training involved high/medium/low risk scenarios with the use of non-lethal simunition training ammunition. The scenarios involved, but not limited to; traffic stops, domestic disturbances, various altercations, and building searches. The training was critiqued on how each training officer completed the scenario and evaluated on how they completed each task from take down, handcuffing, weapon retention, body searches, body language, and proper verbal commands in handling each situation.

Educationally, Philip began his education at Fairmont State University and completed his Criminal Justice degree at Marshall University.
