Personal Care

Staffing

All residents are involved in parks dept classes, field trips, and special olympics. we also take residents to movies, shows, sporting events, dining out, parties, etc.... we provide these services free of charge, but do expect residents and/or their family to pay for the basic cost of the activity(ie. fee for classes, dining, movie/show tickets, etc...). people with disabilities have the right to be involved and included in their community.
