Personal Care

“Personal care services” means both physical assistance and/or prompting and supervising the performance of direct personal care tasks as determined by the resident’s needs, and does not include assistance with tasks performed by a licensed health professional. (WAC 388-76-10000)

1. EATING

<p>If needed, the home may provide assistance with eating as follows: The home will serve 3 meals a day and two snacks a day , the home will prepare the food for the clients, pureed food or thickened drinks, and feed the residents.</p>
<p>2. TOILETING If needed, the home may provide assistance with toileting as follows: the home will assist the client to go to the bathroom. Do peri wash after bathroom, and change clients pads when needed.</p>
<p>3. WALKING If needed, the home may provide assistance with walking as follows: the home will keep the walkways clear, support and assist the client while walking or propel their wheelchair if needed.</p>
<p>4. TRANSFERRING If needed, the home may provide assistance with transferring as follows: The home will help and assist the client in and out the bed and wheelchair, using assistive device or hooyer lift if necessary.</p>
<p>5. POSITIONING If needed, the home may provide assistance with positioning as follows:The home will reposition the client every two hours and when needed to avoid pressure points.</p>
<p>6. PERSONAL HYGIENE If needed, the home may provide assistance with personal hygiene as follows: The home will assist or will help the clients to brush their teeth, wash their hands daily, trim their nails when needed and do foot care atleast 3 times a week.</p>
<p>7. DRESSING If needed, the home may provide assistance with dressing as follows: the home will help and assist the client to choose clean clothes, dressed the clients, and adjust clothing, and help or assist the client to put on and take off foot ware.</p>
<p>8. BATHING If needed, the home may provide assistance with bathing as follows: the home will give and assist the client to take a bath every other day or at least 3 times a week, and as needed, if the client cant go to the bath tub or shower the home will give the client a sponge bath every other day or at least 3 or 2 times a week and a needed.</p>
<p>9. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS REGARDING PERSONAL CARE Basic personal care supplies such as soap, shampoo, toothpaste, toilet paper, and tissue will be provided. The Resident will need to supply his/her own special brands or care items such as incontinent supplies, special shampoo, or ointment.</p>
Medication Services
<p>If the home admits residents who need medication assistance or medication administration services by a legally authorized person, the home must have systems in place to ensure the services provided meet the medication needs of each resident and meet all laws and rules relating to medications. (WAC 388-76-10430)</p>

The type and amount of medication assistance provided by the home is:

The Provider or caregiver will assist the Resident with their medications, if needed. If a Resident is unable to administer his/her own medications, is unaware that they are taking medications due to confusion, or is unable to determine when they need specific medication (PRN medications-as All medications must be kept in locked storage and logged on to Resident's records when taken. If a Resident does not need assistance with medication administration, a locked container will be provided to secure the medications in the Resident's rooms.

Medications should be brought to facility by the Resident or the responsible party or delivered by the pharmacy and billed directly to the Resident or responsible party.

All medications including vitamins or other food supplements must be approved in writing by a physician and be included in the resident's medication log. A cognitively alert resident may take an over the counter medication without physician's order but it is the policy of the adult family home to notify the physician when this occurs. If a Resident refuses a medication, the physician will be notified.

ADDITIONAL COMMENTS REGARDING MEDICATION SERVICES

Skilled Nursing Services and Nurse Delegation

If the home identifies that a resident has a need for nursing care and the home is not able to provide the care per chapter 18.79 RCW, the home must contract with a nurse currently licensed in the state of Washington to provide the nursing care and service, or hire or contract with a nurse to provide nurse delegation. (WAC 388-76-10405)

The home provides the following skilled nursing services:

The provider of the adult family home is qualified to be delegated by a RN to perform nurse delegated tasks. The cost of these services will be the sole responsibility of the resident or the responsible party. If a resident receives Medicaid funding, the state will pay for this service. Staff cannot administer injections, or provide unstable wound care. In the event the resident requires nursing care that is not part of the delegated tasks, other nursing services such as home health nursing may be ordered by the Resident's physician.

The home has the ability to provide the following skilled nursing services by delegation:

medication administration, nurse delegation special focus for diabetes.

Staffing
