



Additional opportunities to recycle

Yard waste collection

Through a separate subscription service in burn ban areas, your recycler provides a 90-gallon cart that holds three times as much as your regular trash can. You can recycle:

- Yard waste (grass, leaves, prunings, weeds, brush and branches)
- Vegetable garden waste
- House plants
- Vegetable food waste
- Meat, fish, poultry, or dairy products
- Shredded paper

Shredded paper

Recycle shredded paper in your yard waste collection cart. Paper consists of fibers. Long fibers can be recycled into new paper but shredding shortens the fibers, limiting the types of products it can be made into. Short fibers become waste at the paper mill. By recycling shredded paper in your yard waste cart, you're adding a beneficial ingredient to the compost process.

Free Computer and TV Recycling

Computers, monitors, laptops and televisions can be recycled free at many locations in Kitsap County. This environmentally responsible program is funded by computer manufacturers and is available to households, charities, small businesses, schools and small governments.

To find a location near you, visit www.kitsapgov.com/sw and click the E-CYCLE logo. These items can't be disposed of as garbage.



Household hazardous waste

Some products are hazardous and may not be disposed of in your garbage can or curbside recycle carts. These include:

- Fluorescent lights
- Paints
- Pesticides
- Cleaners
- Garden chemicals
- Batteries
- Used motor oil
- Antifreeze
- Spa chemicals

These items can be properly managed at the Kitsap County Household Hazardous Waste Collection Facility. Hours: Thursday to Saturday from 10 am – 4 pm. Location: 5551 SW Imperial Way, Port Orchard, in the Olympic View Industrial Park across from the Bremerton National Airport.

Questions and Answers

Q: When do I put my cart out for pick up?

A: **Waste Management Customers:** Your cart lid is marked A or B. Follow the A or B schedule provided by your hauler. Bremerton residents, your cart is marked W or E (west or east). Please have your cart at the curb by 6 a.m. on your pick up day.

Bainbridge Disposal Customers: Please follow the printed calendar that came with your cart or go to www.Bainbridgedisposal.com.

Q: What should I do with recyclables that won't fit in the cart?

A: Items left outside of the cart will not be collected. If you routinely have more recyclables than will fit in one cart, call your recycling company for an additional cart.

You may also self-haul extra recyclables to a Recycling and Garbage Facility. For locations and hours, call Kitsap 1 or visit www.kitsapgov.com/sw.

Q: How clean do recyclables need to be?

A: Recyclables must be free of visible food residue. They cannot be cleaned after they have been collected.

Q: Why can't I recycle plastics other than bottles, jugs, jars, and dairy tubs?

A: Without a stable market, a nearby buyer, and consistent volumes, it is not economical to recycle some types of plastic. If you mix the wrong plastics in the collection container, it costs more to sort your recyclables. This increases program costs, so please recycle it right!

What goes in curbside recycling?

Empty, clean, and discard lids



Plastic bottles, jugs, jars, and dairy tubs (no lids)



Cardboard (must fit in cart)



Mail, magazines, mixed paper and catalogs



Glass



Phone books



Milk-style cartons



Paper or frozen food boxes (no food residue)



Paper boxes (no liners)



Metal cans (labels ok)



Aluminum cans



Newspaper & inserts

DO NOT recycle at curbside

Batteries



Styrofoam



Shredded paper (OK in yard waste cart)



Glassware & plate glass



Clear clamshell containers



Video Tapes



Plastic cups
