

## Sign Up For Curbside Collection

## Haul It To The Snohomish County Neighborhood Recycling And Disposal Center (NRDC) In Sultan

You can haul one yard of debris to the NRDC for \$20. (Note: wood debris will be disposed of as garbage, not recycled). The site is open Thursday through Monday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

*Outdoor burning seems harmless, but it is as dangerous as cigarette smoke—and can contribute to birth defects, cancer and lung disease. Outdoor fires are banned in most areas and can carry fines up to \$16,000 per day. Contact the Office of the County Fire Marshal at 425-388-3557 or your local fire district with burn permit questions.*
