## Free Electronics Recycling Program Now Available

### MANY CONVENIENT LOCATIONS

In 2009, electronics manufacturers began providing a new free recycling system for residents, small businesses, schools and charities called E-cycle Washington. In 2009, over 5.5 million pounds of electronics were recycled from Snohomish County sources!

At select locations, there is no charge for recycling:

- computers
- monitors
- laptops
- televisions

## The Program

This free “product stewardship” program is required by law in Washington State and paid for by the companies that make computers, laptops, monitors and televisions. Manufacturers practice product stewardship when they provide recycling for their products, and when they work to make their products more environmentally friendly and more recyclable.

Snohomish County, legislators, electronics companies, recyclers, advocacy groups, and many others have worked together to bring you this program.

The locations listed are participating in the manufacturers’ product stewardship program, and will accept limited quantities of computers, laptops, monitors and televisions from qualified customers at no charge. All are local charities and/or businesses who will benefit from receiving these electronics from you.

Manufacturers providing the program are adhering to very high standards for recycling to protect human health and the environment, making this one of the best ways you can recycle and trust that your old equipment isn’t creating a problem somewhere else.

Your equipment might be reused or refurbished. It is your responsibility to remove personal data prior to providing equipment to a collector.

## How It Works


The program is available for residents, small businesses, charities, schools and some government agencies, and is only available through participating locations.

Free recycling is only for computers, laptops, monitors and televisions. You may have to pay a fee for keyboards, printers, fax machines and any other desktop peripheral devices. Not all locations take additional equipment, even for a fee.

Check with each site regarding their limits or restrictions. If you have more than 10 units to recycle, contact the manufacturer’s program directly at 1-866-779-6632 for instructions on what to do and where to take equipment for recycling.

If you use collection services that provide the convenience of curbside collection or at-home services, you may be assessed a charge for those additional services.

Some computer equipment can be refurbished and provided to low-income families and aid programs. One such program is Interconnection at 425-335-7787 or [www.interconnection.org](http://www.interconnection.org). Donations are tax deductible.
