Fall Recycling Event offered at Centennial Fields

Snoqualmie, WA – The City of Snoqualmie is hosting a household recycle event, which is open to all King County residents.

The event will take place on Saturday, September 15 at Centennial Fields Park, 39903 SE Park Street in Snoqualmie (Adjacent to Snoqualmie Elementary School).

Recycling Drop-Off: 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

A comprehensive list of what will and will not be accepted at the recycling event is posted on the City of Snoqualmie website at www.cityofsnoqualmie.org in 'Community Activities'.

Items accepted include reusable household goods including small appliances; batteries; tires; petroleum products; fluorescent bulbs/tubes; televisions, computer monitors, and other electronics; refrigerators, freezers, and air conditioners; and scrap metal appliances.

Note: Latex paint is not accepted. It should be dried out and placed in regular garbage bins.

Please do not bring oil-based paints, pesticides, household chemicals, packing peanuts, planter pots, lighting fixtures, or other non-acceptable or hazardous waste items included on the recycle list. Take these to the Household Hazardous Wastemobile, which will be in Duvall October 12-14.

Document Destruction: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Residents are invited to bring up to three grocery bags or two copy paper sized boxes of *residential* records such as bank statements, ATM receipts, and old tax records.
