Undetermined pump size, a pressure-storage tank, and a 1" or a 1¼" distribution line.

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REPORT

I recommend issuance of a permit for Application #S2-28417 based on the following report:

BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to Chapter 90.03 Revised Code of Washington (RCW), Gary Szolomayer applied for a permit to appropriate public surface water from a spring, tributary to the Dosewallips River. A diversion rate of .02 cfs was requested for single domestic supply. The application was assigned a priority date of February 29, 1992.

Legal notice of the proposed appropriation was published in the "Port Townsend Jefferson County Leader" on March 18 and 25, 1992. No protests were received as a result of this notice.

INVESTIGATIONS:

Investigations included a review of Department of Ecology records of surface water rights and claims downstream of the diversion site. Gary Szolomayer was contacted by telephone for additional information.

Location

The point of diversion is located in the foothills of the Olympic Mountains, approximately three miles northwest of the town of Brinnon in Jefferson County. The surrounding area is dominated by Olympic National Forest land, with light residential development along the Dosewallips River.

The subject "spring" is actually a small stream which originates to the east of the Szolomayer property. The stream flows through the property in a southwesterly direction to the Dosewallips River.

Water System Description

Details of the water system have not been determined. The house will be located uphill from the diversion site. The proposed system will include a pump, a pressure-storage tank, and a 1-inch or 1¼-inch distribution line to the house.

Effect on Existing Rights

Department of Ecology records indicate that no surface water rights have been issued downstream of this site. One surface water claim, #159142, has been issued in Section 28. If the diversion for Claim #159142 is located downstream of the Szolomayer's diversion, and if it represents a vested water right, then withdrawals under this water right may need to be regulated in favor of that claim during a water shortage.

Washington Department of Fisheries had no comments on the proposed diversion. Comments received from Washington Department of Wildlife for a similar application indicate that resident fish may be present in this stream. Screening of the intake (with 1/8-inch mesh with maximum approach velocity 0.40 ft/sec) and Hydraulic Project Approval may be required for this project. The applicant should contact the Department of Wildlife (see "Provisions" below).

Water Requirement

Water requirements for single domestic supply should not exceed an average of 450 gallons per day, or 0.5 acre-feet per year.

CONCLUSION:

Report Continued

In accordance with Chapter 90.03 RCW, I find there is water available for appropriation from the source in question, that the appropriation as recommended is a beneficial use, and should not impair existing rights or be detrimental to public welfare.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

I recommend approval of this application and issuance of a permit to allow appropriation of .02 cfs, 0.5 acre-feet per year, from the subject stream for single domestic supply. The period of use shall be year-round, as needed.

This permit is subject to existing rights and to the following provisions:

PROVISIONS

"Overflow from the diversion shall be directed into the natural stream channel."

This permit may be subject to Washington Departments of Fisheries and Wildlife screening criteria as outlined in a hydraulic project approval. Please contact the Department of Fisheries, 115 General Administration Building, Olympia, Washington, 98504, Attention: Habitat Management Division, (206) 753-6640; or the Department of Wildlife, 600 North Capitol, Olympia, Washington, 98504, Attention: Habitat Management Division, (206)753-3318, to obtain specified requirements for your project.

At such time that the Department of Ecology determines the regulation and management of the subject waters is necessary and in the public interest, an approved measuring device shall be installed and maintained in accordance with RCW 90.03.360 and WAC 508-64-020 through -040.

The Water Resources Act of 1971 specifies certain criteria regarding utilization and management of the waters of the State in the best public interest. Favorable consideration of this application has been based on sufficient waters available, at least during portions of the year. However, it is pointed out to the applicant that this use of water may be subject to regulation at certain times, based on the necessity to maintain water quantities sufficient for preservation of the natural environment.

The applicant is advised that notice of proof of appropriation of water (under which the final certificate of water right is issued) should not be filed until the permanent diversion facilities have been installed, and the system is currently in use. This includes installation of a mainline system capable of delivering the recommended quantity of water to an existing or proposed distribution system within the area to be served, and fulfillment of all other terms of this permit.
